The 7<sup>th</sup> Annual Bishop Stanley Bilinski United YMSofR Men's Spiritual Retreat took place June 12-15, 2024 on the beautiful grounds of Spojnia Farm in Waymart, PA. The theme of the Retreat was "Iron Sharpens Iron" and is based off of Proverbs 27:7- "As iron sharpens iron, so one man sharpens another." The retreat was planned by a subcommittee consisting of Rev. Jason Soltysiak, Rev. Jim Konicki, Rev. Jim Ploskonka, Nick Kazinetz, Dave Pecynski, Andrew Humphreys, and Kevin McConlogue.

Wednesday afternoon marked arrivals, with attendees from 5 states converging at the Bishop Hodur Retreat and Recreation Center. Rooms were chosen, acquaintances were made and renewed, and a few of the able men assisted in the raising of the new cross on Kicker Hill. Appreciation to Chuck Daehn (Holy Mother of the Rosary; Lancaster, NY) who couldn't wait to offer his expertise in muscling the cross into place. The men were eventually called down to newly renovated Great Hall





where the opening dinner was served. Sufficiently fed, the retreat began in earnest with prayer Wednesday evening. The Rt. Rev. John Mack, Bishop-Ordinary of the Buffalo-Pittsburgh Diocese, blessed new vestments for use at the retreat center. The vestments were purchased from donations made from the YMSofR 90 for 90 campaign a few years back, uplifting the worship life of attendees as well as the recreational life at Spojnia Farm. Donning the newly-blessed vestments, Very Rev. John Kowalczyk (St. Michael the Archangel; Cedar Lake, IN) led the opening liturgy, which was the Exposition of the Most Blessed Sacrament. The Blessed Sacrament is a focus each year at our retreat; it is exposed and available for adoration from this opening liturgy until our final Mass.

An 8am breakfast welcomed the men on Thursday, followed by flag raising and our first Mass was offered by Bishop John Mack. It was a votive Mass of a Spiritual Retreat, with the priest's present serving as concelebrants. Very Rev. Charles Zawistowski (Administrator of the PNCC Western Diocese/St. Mary's; South Bend, IN) offered the homily via Zoom, focusing on the expanse of the love of God made known through His Son, Jesus Christ. Fr. Sr. John Kowalczyk topped our morning with a well-rounded presentation on "The Brotherhood of St. Paul, forged by Iron."

We prayed the Angelus (David Humphreys) before lunch and enjoyed what has been perhaps the most memorable meal of our 7 years of retreat. While pierogi (store bought and St. Mary's in Parma) were served, the showstopper was the response of the men of "Show us your favorite kielbasa!" Partitioned out in 3 categories (smoked, fresh, miscellaneous/other), we had 22 different kielbasas to taste

and determine winners in each category. And just as serious the response to bring kielbasa was the care that these Polish and Polish-adjacent men took in meticulously sampling, comparing, re-tasting, taking notes, scoring, and commenting on each variety.

An afternoon of free time consisted of choice between a limousine tour of Lake Wallenpaupack, a 9-hole golf outing, a trip to local PNCC Sites, or an afternoon of solitude.

Following the afternoon, a pool patio BBQ took place, with stories shared of the afternoon. A visiting Brady Soltysiak offering grace for the men in attendance. Three Eucharistic Devotions, prepared by Rev. Jim Konicki, were offered after dinner in the Eucharistic Chapel. Fr. Konicki led a reflection on "Jesus, Pre-Figured"; Fr. Ploskonka led one on "Jesus, Revealed"; and Fr. Sr. Kowalczyk on "Jesus, Lived". Each reflection built upon each other and the full idea that Jesus always was supposed to be present in the Blessed Sacrament.

After breakfast and clean up, Friday morning, the men acknowledged Flag Day (June 14) by gathering not only for flag raising, but for the blessing of a new American Flag. Deacon Justin Daviault (Eastern Diocese) offered the blessing upon the flag, with the veterans of the group (David Dudzinski, David Humphreys, Ray Bielski, Deacon Justin) raising it before the gathered faithful. Deacon Justin then offered a session on his life as a neo-deacon in the Polish National Catholic Church, telling stories and fielding questions in what served as an informal vocations panel.

Holy Mass followed the session and was offered by Rev. Jim Konicki. It was a votive Mass to the Word of God, and Very Rev. Joseph Krusienski (Administrative Senior-Eastern Diocese Southeast Seniorate) of-

fered the sermon, encircling the PNCC's sacramentology, history of the Word of God as Sacrament, and incorporation the Symbol of the PNCC through it all.

After lunch clean-up, there was an hour of silent time, with the requirement to turn off technology. Some spent the time before the Eucharist, others in their rooms, and others in "quiet" conversation. Rev. Jim Ploskonka then led a session on the reality of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, placing the faithful in a courtroom setting while setting up and knocking down theories against the Resurrection as if they were bowling pins.

Dodging raindrops after a quiet afternoon, the men welcomed our keynote speaker of the event, SSG. Earl Granville. Sergeant Granville was originally from the area and committed to service just days before September 11, 2001. His assignments overseas were in defense of our nation and following that event. He met with the guys for an hour or so before his speech, and after a hearty official welcome by Fr. Jason, he spoke for an hour on his life and what kept him going through some bleak and desperate times. He then fielded a variety of questions ranging from his faith, national defense policies, his life in Northeast Pennsylvania, collegiality amongst veterans, adaptations to life as an amputee, and more. SSG Granville speaks all across America and we are thankful to donors who helped make his appearance at our retreat possible.

The event closed with hearty appetizers served by local legend Mama Kaz (with righthand gal Wanda Stash). Deacon Justin closed the evening with the Litany of the Most Blessed Sacrament and the men scattered off for conversation, a bonfire, a bit more tv, and solitude.

Saturday was our final morning together and began with Morning Prayer and flag raising before breakfast. Fr. Jason led the morning prayer and Ray Bielski, our flagraiser extraordinaire, raised the flag a final time for our event.

The Most Rev. Anthony Mikovsky then arrived and offered our final session, which was on our theme of "Iron Sharpens Iron". He detailed some observations he made on his (long) daily visits to our retreat and applied them to his words. He focused on

how culturally adept the phrase "iron sharpens iron" was in the time it was written, and how if there were no sharpening stones available, friends would literally sharpens one's blade across that of another's – literally sharpening each other in the process.

Following our final session was our final Mass. Very Rev. Zbigniew Dawid (Holy Mother of Sorrows; Dupont, PA) served as celebrant for a Mass for Health, and Rev. Jason Soltysiak offered a homily that explained the Sacrament of Anointing, its history in scripture, how and why oil was used, and the availability of the Sacrament to the men present this day. After Mass, all were anointed by Father Senior for their needs of heart, soul, body, mind, and for traveling mercies.

Fr. Jason offered final words of thanks to all who worked prior to, during, and attended the retreat. Prime Bishop commended the work of the United YMSofR, and President Nick Kazinetz offered some potential adventures for the YMSofR ahead. Special thanks was given to the kitchen and clean up help: Nick K., Dave P., Bob G., Dave H., Chuck D., Jeremy N., Andrew H., and Kevin M.

Our retreat continues to grow annually in numbers and spirit because of the dedication of the men of the Church to ensure that it is a spiritual event worthy of one's attendance. The schedule is argued-over

and debated to make sure it retains the balance of spirit, worship, downtime, and activity worthy of a retreat geared towards men of the Church. May this event continue to glorify God and to envelop in His love and care the men of the Polish National Catholic Church and beyond.

enjoyed by all in attendance and a display of traditional Catholicism in a world moving away from traditional practices. God was praised!










# **Word of God Sunday**

Sunday, June 9 was the premiere of the Solemnity of the Word of God in the Polish National Catholic Church. Promulgated by the Bishops of the PNCC, this Feast raises this Sacrament, unique to the PNCC, the highest rank of a day: Solemnity. Unique within the Catholic tradition, the Polish National Catholic Church recognizes the preaching and hearing of the Word of God as a Sacrament. Our Church combines Baptism and Confirmation as the first sacrament, as Confirmation is the completion of Baptism, and adds The Preaching and Hearing of the Word of God as the second Sacrament. This understanding of preaching as a sacramental action came about at the Second General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church held in Scranton, Pennsylvania on September 28 and 29, 1909. A report of the Synod, printed in the Church's official organ in 1913, gives the official report of the Synod: "Hearing of the Word of God preached according to the teachings of Christ the Lord and the Apostles, has sacramental force, that is, it causes in us the same effects as does the receiving of the other sacraments."

Holy Mass on Fathers' Day, June 16, was celebrated by the "elder statesman" of the clergy of St. Mary's, Rev. Greg Gronn.






drafted, with our own Brady drafted as captain of his very own team, named, "The Brady Bunch."


