One of the odd things that has become second nature for me many years ago is living on multiple calendars- the regular civil calendar and the liturgical calendar. I write about this often, if only because every once in a while, something calendar-wise jumps out that I've never noticed before.

Hidden within the depths of the dog days of summer and Ordinary Time is an exact month of which we look at the patronage of Saint Mary from a variety of angles, all brought alive in worship and the liturgy of the Church. We celebrated these days since our last newsletter ran, so I wanted to share how the church honored Mary during that time.

The first day of prominence would be August 15ths Solemnity of the Dormi-





tion of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This is an interesting day in the life of a Polish National Catholic, as it is not the "Feast of the Assumption" as it may be called in other denominations. In 1950, Pope Pius XII declared the Assumption of Mary official Dogma of the Roman Catholic Church. The Roman Church teaches that the Virgin Mary "having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory."

The term "Dormition" means "falling asleep." The belief of the early church was that Mary entered into rest in a painless and spiritual way, and then her body was assumed into Heaven. This theology held on for many centuries, until the (above) edict of Pius XII cast a bit of confusion, leaving it nebulous whether Mary died or not before being assumed into Heaven. The fact that this vagueness was made into Church Dogma (defined as revealed by God and binding to the faith, given by church leadership {in this case, an infallible Pope}) made it to be an undeniable matter of faith to some and a matter of ridicule to others.


All of this is not scriptural, but based on Catholic Tradition and writings from the first few centuries of Christianity. Of course, as a denomination organized in the 19th Century, the rigidness of the Dogma does not apply to members of the PNCC, but it is not by any means unacceptable to believe. The PNCC

simply falls in line with what was traditional Catholic/Orthodox teaching on the Tradition that Mary, having died (fallen asleep) like all other humans, was then taken up to heaven. Liturgically, flowers and herbs are blessed at church to represent the beautiful floral bed left behind after Mary rose to Heaven.

The second day in this hidden "month to Mary" would be August 26th's Solemnity of Our Lady of Czestochowa, or the Blessed Virgin Mary of Czestochowa.

Our parish of St. Mary's once carried the full moniker of "Saint Mary of Czestochowa", which is kind of an indirect translation of the Solemnity. The legend says that after Jesus' crucifixion, when the Virgin Mary moved to St. John's home, she took with her some personal articles, among them a table made by our Redeemer in St. Joseph's workshop. The story continues and says that when the pious women of Jerusalem asked St. Luke to do a painting of the Mother of God, he used this table to paint the image. The image remained in Jerusalem for a time, until the Romans began to destroy the city.

However, St. Helen, mother of Constantine and the powerful, faith-filled



woman responsible for the "legality" of Christianity discovered this, and with Divine providence guided the image to Constantinople, where it was carefully protected. By 802, the image appeared in Russia. During a war in the middle of the fourteenth century, the image was struck by an enemy arrow. Prince Wladyslaw, in order to prevent the destruction of the image, decided to transport it to Poland. While traveling through Poland, with the image in a horse drawn carriage, the horses refused to go any further when they reached the town of Czestochowa. The prince went up to the chapel on top of the hill Jasna Gora to pray, since he saw the horses' refusal to go on as a divine message. In a dream, Our Lady appeared to him, and told him she wanted the image to be venerated there in Czestochowa. This was in the year 1382. The prince ordered the building of a monastery and an even larger church. She has been in Czestochowa since this time, and has become a national treasure of the Polish people,

who venerate her as the Queen of Poland. The present Basilica in which the image resides was built in 1902.

Liturgically, we offered a blessing upon the images of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Czestochowa and said prayers before her altar to conclude Holy Mass.

The third feast would be September 8th's Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This is an interesting feast day because it was almost an afterthought on the calendar. In the early church, the example of life given from heaven would always be the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary (March 25...9 months before Christmas Day) that Mary was pregnant by the Holy Spirit, which made her conception of Jesus (life within her, Word made Flesh) more important than the day of birth. Therefore, "conception" days took a greater prominence in the early church, with the Conception of the Blessed Mother listed at an exact 9 month's prior on December 8th.

Liturgically, the only extra "thing" that we do is offer prayers before Mary's Altar to conclude Mass. Like all Marian days, the Marian altar is decorated, the candles are lighted thereupon, and a Marian hymn concludes Mass.

The final feast of the hidden month of Mary is September 15ths (exactly one month after the Dormition) Holy Mother of Sorrows, or Our Lady of Sorrows.

This Solemnity focuses on the 7 traditional Sorrows of Mary, which are: 1:The Prophecy of Simeon (Luke 2:25-35); 2: The flight into Egypt (Matthew 2:13-15); 3: The Child Jesus Lost in the Temple (Luke 2:41-50); 4: Mary meets Jesus carrying the cross (Station of the Cross #4, Luke 23:27-29), 5: Mary at the foot of the cross (Station of the Cross #11, John 19:25-30) 6: Mary receives the body of Jesus/Jesus is taken down

from the cross (Station of the Cross #13, John 19:38), 7: Mary witnesses the burial of Jesus, her son (Station of the Cross #14, Luke 23:50-56).

Liturgically, there is a special sequence that precedes the gospel called the "Stabat Mater dolorosa", which precedes the Gospel and can be recited or chanted.

Of course, there are a number of other days on the Calendar of the

Church where Mary is honored, and months (May for the totality of "her"; October for the Rosary) where Mary is honored, but there is no single month long period where we have as many of her feast days occurring than what I just laid forth for us—a "hidden month" devoted to the Blessed Virgin Mary.
