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Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ's)

Over the last few months, between Facebook, YouTube, and our own congregation, I've had some questions come up that were new for me...and some that I have been answering my entire 15+ year priesthood. Some are pretty "official" while some are rather cutesy and I would like to address some of these.

FAQ 1 – What kind of wine do you use at Mass?

Sacramental wine, which you (normally) can't buy at any distributer. Now, some of the types of wine may be popular elsewhere, like Rose or Catawba, but my two favorites are *Angelica* and *La Salle Special*. Both are sweet and strong (like me?) and are from Mont Lasalle Winery, which is an approved Sacramental Wine maker. Sacramental Wine is free from additives and preservatives and





are only made from grapes. So, no hints of apple or peach...grape, which is traditional to how wine was created in the time and place of Christ. I've always preferred stronger (18%) wine because it gives me a sense of security when sharing a chalice if the other priest has the sniffles or something.

FAQ 2 – What is the difference between altar bread (hosts) and oplatek (Christmas Wafers)?

Materially...nothing. Both are to be



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shape is different, with hosts for the priest and the congregation being round (circles are a sign of perfection) while Christmas Wafers are usually rectangle, square in some places.



FAQ 3 – Why do bishops wear such funny-shaped hats?

While I wouldn't disagree with the assessment to the shape of these hats, the answer makes sense and is curious at the same time. A bishop's miter is to represent the tongues of fire that rested upon the heads of those gathered at the Day of Pentecost. Believers present that day were endowed with unique gifts for new ministry — a bishop when wearing his miter is often doing things a priest cannot with the same power of the gifted Spirit.

FAQ 4 – Does a bishop HAVE to be seated for Confirmation or SHOULD he be seated?

Although the Ritual calls for the bishop to be seated (as it is the position of authority in the Catholic Church), we are also reminded that the Bishop is the chief liturgist of the diocese. Should he decide it is proper to stand to administer the Rite of Confirma-



tion, then it may well be the standard for the diocese while he is in office. The Church has many liturgical examples of "standards from which we deviate," but when a bishop does something different, it isn't really a deviation; it is simply the "updated practice."

FAQ 5 – Have you ever read the entire Bible?

I have – though in a way I wouldn't recommend. I had a desire to read it while I was in Seminary just to say I completed it and I cannot say everything stuck with me the way I desired. Teaching a bible study or spending a year preaching on the Gospel of Mark or slowly reading through a printed biblical commentary have all proved far more fruitful in understanding, remembering, enjoying, memorizing, and applying scripture.

Since Seminary, through daily scripture, Divine Office, personal study and



others, I would venture to say I have read through the entire New Testament a few times and perhaps 75% of the Old Testament. Some of that stuff is tough to read!

FAQ 6 – What is your favorite book? My default answer is the Bible, but the book I have read the most by a pretty significant margin is *The Outsiders* by S.E. Hinton. I read it first in 7th grade – it was assigned a class reading book and I read the entire thing the first day I got it. Taking the (actually good!) movie based on

the book out of the equation, I would guess I have read it between 15 and 20 times in my life.

FAQ 7 – Why don't churches have Communion/Altar Rails anymore?

If the NFL is a copycat league then the Church is as well. For example, in football, once a team wins a championship doing something slightly different than every other team, then most teams seem to copy that model. Same in the Catholic Church. At the formation of the PNCC, the Communion Rail was standard- it served to separate the Sanctuary from the nave of the church as well as to facilitate a place for the faithful to approach and kneel in order to receive Communion.

In the Roman Catholic Church, resulting in changes that began at the 2nd Vatican Council, it was recommended in the United States that the faithful receive standing up and in processional form – negating the *need* for a rail.

Many of our parishes have adopted this as an acknowledgement of liturgical reform – that liturgy is a living and evolving practice, not a timepiece of anyone's particular childhood memory. Some parishes (PNCC and others) retain the rail for practical use, for aesthetics, or simply, no desire to remove it.



September 2022 - The Eucharist in the Blessed Sacrament

During the month of September as we continue our focus of Being Eucharistic People – we take some time to reflect on the important teaching of Church on the Holy Eucharist as found in paragraph 6 of the Declaration of Scranton. Enjoy the wonderful explanation of this teaching of our Church given by our Prime Bishop, His Grace, Anthony Mikovsky.

Scripture: (Acts 2:46-47) Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home, and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people.

Reflection: The Declaration of Scranton formulated and accepted by the P.N.C.C. Bishops on April 28, 2008 and later accepted by the Clergy Conference and the General

Synod, helps guide the Church in its relationships with other Christian bodies. The document has allowed us to enter into fruitful and real ecclesial relations with the Nordic Catholic Church in Scandinavia and the rest of Europe. The largest and most vital paragraph of this document speaks to our faith in the Holy Eucharist and the celebration of Mass, which must be a part of any agreement that we have between Churches.

Important aspects of our faith are spoken of within this paragraph: Holy Mass is "the true central point of Catholic worship." We confess that we receive "the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ." When we gather for Mass we also know that we unite ourselves with "the one offering which Jesus Christ makes in Heaven." During the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, we participate in a true connection between heaven and earth.





PNCC Future Dir. (Con't)

This paragraph also shows us that when we gather at Holy Mass as a parish, there is also something else that occurs. It allows us to come together and unite ourselves to each other. The Holy Eucharist is "at the same time, a sacrificial feast by means of which the faithful in receiving the Body and Blood of our Savior enter into communion with one another (1 Cor. 10:17)." This reference to the First Letter to the Corinthians is recited during the Contemporary Rite of Mass, "Because there is one bread, we who are many, are one body, because we all partake of the one bread." This one body, our parish church, is also Christ present in the world today in another way. All then that the parish does, in the worship of God and in service to God's people, especially those within our local communities, is participating in the work of Jesus Christ in the world today. What we do at Holy Mass allows us to extend the presence of Jesus Christ, outside our Church walls.
