"Do You Believe This?"

Those words are taken from Chapter 11, verse 26 of St. John's Gospel and serves as the theme for the 2025 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. The full scripture selection for this year's celebration follows:

When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary stayed at home. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him." Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again." Martha said to him, "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world."

Encompassing the Gospel of John, 11:17-27, we hear this incredible declaration of faith



by Martha that not only does she believe in the Resurrection, she believes that her friend and rabbi, Jesus, is Messiah and Son of God.

Martha! The one before whom Jesus almost sighed and dismissed-away in frustration compared to her sister Mary in Luke 10: 41-42: "Martha, Martha, you are worried and upset about many things. But only one thing is necessary, for Mary has chosen the good part, which will not be taken away from her."

Martha has come full-circle, and so has Christianity in its understanding that there is strength beyond local and denominational community. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity was established over 100 years ago and takes place January 18-25 in the Northern Hemisphere each year.

Why is it different than the Southern Hemisphere? The same reason we wouldn't have it 6 months from now in the middle of July it's vacation time for many and a lowerattended portion of church, which is the opposite in the other hemisphere.

The timing is significant: January 18 is the Feast of The Chair of St. Peter at Antioch. Peter's Chair at Antioch, a traditional date that notes his establishment of a church in Antioch of Syria (present-day Turkey) and his service as their bishop.

> January 25 is the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul. Paul's conversion day allows us to meditate and pray upon the vastness of God's grace and mercy to even the worst

of sinners. The span of days shows that the Church is indeed built up from bishops to the worst sinners and everyone between!

As 2025 also marks 1700 years from one of the most important Ecumenical Events in history, the Council of Nicaea, the World Council of Churches (of which the Polish National Catholic Church is a member) has provided a daily prayer meditation focus, reflecting on aspects of the Nicene Creed, approved 1700 years ago:

Day 1: The fatherhood and care of God who rules the universe Day 2: Creation as God's work Day 3: The Incarnation of the Son Day 4: The Paschal Mystery: Passion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus Day 5: The Holy Spirit, the giver of life and joy Day 6: The Church: Community of believers Day 7: Baptism into the Death and Resurrection of the Lord Day 8: Waiting for the Kingdom and the life to come

The Week of Prayer will remain in the prayer life of the liturgies at St. Mary's for those 8 days. The ultimate goal of Christian Unity is the understanding and sharing of faith in our Lord and Savior, without walls and rules separating brothers and sisters who are indeed "rowing the boat of faith" in the same direction.

Pray for the Unity of Christians this January, as Jesus prayed to the Father in John 17:20-21a: "My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. "



December Worship at St. Mary's (p. 1 of 3)

The month of December, which brings about the Advent Season is such a special one in the life of the church. It spans what many call "the holiday season", roughly from Thanksgiving to the moment of our Lord's birth. It always encapsulates the 4 Sundays preceding Christmas Day, ranging from 21 to a full 28 days long.

On the First Sunday of Advent, December 1st, the Advent Wreath was blessed and the first candle (Hope) was lit. Brady took on the reading for this candle for the first time, happily proclaiming the hope we have in the promise of our Lord's coming.



The Second Sunday of Advent, December 8th, featured the lighting of the second Advent Candle (Peace), with the reading debut of Roland, confidently proclaiming the peace





we know in Jesus' coming. Fr. Greg then offered a blessing over the oplatki that many would later come to share at their Christmas Eve and Christmas Day meals. During announcements prior to Mass, Fr. Jason announced that he bumped into St. Nicholas a couple days earlier on his Feast Day of December 6. Though members of the Mission Team prepped the stockings, it seemed as if the magic of jolly ol' St. Nick filled them up with goodies for the faithful on their way out of church. Thank you to all whose fortuitous planning made this event take place!



On December 9 at a 9am Monday Morning Mass, we celebrated the Feast of Divine Love/Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which was translated from December 8. This was the first of three pauses we make throughout

the Advent Season to directly focus on the Mother of God, Mary. In particular, this feast focuses on tradition of the Church and parenting of Joachim and Anna that led Mary to be chosen by God.



On December 12, Fr. Jim celebrated Holy Mass on the Solemnity of Our Lady of Guadalupe, where for a second time in Advent, the focus again turns to the Blessed Mother and the interactions she has had with humanity in apparitions before us.

Sunday, December 15 was the Third Sunday of Advent, Gaudete Sunday, or rose Sunday. The third Advent Candle (Joy) was lit and the reading was done by Brady once again. After Mass, the parish came together to hold its Election of Officers Meeting. Congratulations to all who were elected! Results are on page 5.

At 7am on Wednesday, December 18. a third pause in the Advent Season was taken to celebrate the **Blessed Virgin Mary as Rorate Mass** was celebrated. This Mass, celebrated by candlelight only, is to begin in candlelit darkness and conclude with the rising of the sun, which took place at 7:48am as the faithful exited the church. It was preceded by a blessing of rosaries, which were provided by (Fr. Jason's old Convo friend!) Sarah from All Saints PNCC in Sterling Hts., MI and they were also distributed to those attending that afternoon's Food Ministry.

Hymns were sung in adulation before Mary, with the Mass's focus on her



role in becoming the Mother of our Lord.

The Fourth Sunday

of Advent began with young Roland providing a reading before the lighting of the Fourth Advent Candle, and the Mass celebrated (back in Advent blue!) and Fr. Jason preaching on the interaction of Mary and Elizabeth, with the leaping infant in her womb. It was a nice, packed sanctuary (and a healthy amount of the faithful in the pews!) with three altar servers and Fr. Greg part of the liturgy. The PTO Christmas Party (page 6) followed Holy Mass.

Then it was Christmas! Our celebration has held the same schedule for years, with our choir providing a concert of carols beginning at 11:30pm on Christmas Eve and Pasterka/Shepherd's Mass at Midnight. The faithful at Mass were provided with candles as the statue of the infant Christ was processed into church preceding Mass. The manger scene was blessed, and the Christmas





Candle in the Wreath was lit, completing its change from an Advent Wreath to a Christmastide wreath, which would be lighted at each liturgy through the Epiphany on January 6.

A high Holy Mass followed, with incensing at the Entrance, the Gospel, and the Offertory. Carols were sung in English and Polish. It was an interesting change with how many young children from the parish attended Midnight Mass...some of them even stayed awake through its entirety!

Mass on Christmas Day was celebrated at 10am as the Lord was welcomed by more members of the parish. The Gospel was incensed and the homily focused on the light of the world present in our Savior.

The three days that follow Christmas are noteworthy: the Feast Days of St. Stephen on the 26th, St. John on the 27th, and the Holy Innocents on the 28th. Fr. Jim served as celebrant of St. Stephen's Day. Fr. Jason celebrated St. John's Day Mass, with Fr. Jim providing the blessing of wine that would be shared by all after Mass. Mass for the Holy Innocents was celebrated privately.

The Christmas Spirit continues so strongly in the first Sunday after


goodies for their break room, just in time for the holidays. Officers receiving the gifts were grateful on a cold, icy morning to be remembered by the community.


