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MASSES...of Masses, part 2

This is a continuation of last month's article that highlights certain types of Masses that have been part of our shared Catholic History.

It seems pretty crazy that I will have been ordained a priest 15 years this January. I have such crystal-clear memories of those days leading up to and including my ordination.

First Solemn High Mass is for many the first Mass celebrated after Ordination. It usually is the day after Ordination, or perhaps the Saturday or Sunday after. Mine was the Sunday afternoon after my ordination, with this neo-presbyter sleeping through morning masses at his home parish for the last time of his life!

A First Solemn High Mass is often attended by the local clergy, by a priest's seminary mates, all sorts of family and friends and a full church of



parishioners and well-wishers. As it falls under a "Solemn High Mass", the choir should be singing all the stuff it can—Glorias, Creeds, Psalms, Hymns—while the celebrant incenses at the Introit/Entrance Hymn, the Gospel, and the Offertory.

+Bishop Stanley Bilinski, our former pastor and my homiletics teacher, taught there was an old tradition for a newly-ordained priest to say 3 Masses before the 1st Solemn High Mass: one for family, one for his parish, and one for his own ministry.

There was a period of time where each parish was required to celebrate the traditional **3 Christmas Masses**. They include: Mass at Midnight, Mass at Dawn, and Mass during the Day. Each tells a different portion of the Christmas Story...and if we include the Vigil Mass of the Nativity of our Lord, we even get the final moments before the Christmas Story. Though not required today, many parishes celebrate some combination of these.

A **Stational Mass** is a phrase we don't use much. It is the celebration of the Eucharist in a cathedral by the diocesan bishop in his role of high priest of the diocese,

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with the help of his priests and other ministers, along with a congregation present.

Tradition for this comes from Christians of Rome who would begin to gather at a church known as the "collecta" (or gathering place) where they would be joined by the assembled clergy of the city and the Pope. The procession would then move through the streets to the Station Church, not far away. Having gathered at the daily "statio" (standing place) the pope would then celebrate a solemn Mass, and fragments of the Host were sent to the "stationes" of the city in order to symbolize the unity of the city around its bishop.

The modern Mass of Chrism is considered a Stational Mass, especially as the Holy Oils, blessed by the bishop and clergy, make their way around the diocese afterward.



Fr. Jason's Article (con't)

A **Pontifical Mass** is a Mass that is reserved for a bishop, with much of the liturgy celebrated from his *cathedra*, or his throne. The bishop would be assisted by two clergy as his chaplains, often with at least one Master of Ceremony providing further assistance.

The bishop would begin Holy Mass from his Cathedra, inviting the faithful to prayer and administering the Sacrament of Penance. The Entrance Rite and, Kyrie, Gloria, and Opening Prayer would be done from the Cathedra as well. As a Pontifical Mass is most likely a Solemn High Mass, incense would be used appropriately at the Entrance Rite, Gospel, and Offertory.



The bishop would then invite all to be hearers of the Sacrament of the Word of God, listening from his Cathedra. It would then be appropriate for him to preach sitting down, as this was how Jesus often taught. However...one could see why a bishop would choose otherwise.

After introducing the Creed as well as the Intercessions/Prayers of the Faithful, the Masters of Ceremony would then bring everything (missal, chalice, intinctoria, etc) to the sacrificial altar before the bishop even approached it. He'd celebrate Mass as we might call "normal" until after the faithful receive Communion, where he would conclude Mass from his Cathedra.

Though the term **Gregorian Mass** may not be familiar with most, it is a familiar concept. For 30 consecutive days, a Mass is offered for a deceased person with the intent for release of the soul from purgatory. These masses can take place at different locations by different priests, but must be for those 30 consecutive days. By virtue of the fact that 30 days is a long time...and the fact that parishes have many

obligations for weekday or weekend mass intentions, these Masses are usually celebrated within the environment of a seminary, monastery, religious community, or some other sort of religious community.

The scriptural basis for this is from Deuteronomy 34:8: "And the children of Israel wept for Moses in the plains of Moab thirty days: so the days of weeping in the mourning for Moses were ended.

The practice of Gregorian Masses goes back to a tradition hailing from Pope St. Gregory the Great (540-604). St. Gregory wrote how one of the monks of his monastery, named Justus, did not keep his vow of poverty very well. When Justus died, St. Gregory feared that the good monk might have to spend a long time in Purgatory (another discussion for another day!) because of this struggle. He therefore ordered that the Holy Sacrifice be offered up for Justus for thirty consecutive days without a break. On the thirtieth day, Justus appeared to a brother monk telling him that he was now freed from his sufferings because of the 30 Masses St. Gregory had caused to be said for him.

Note from Deacon Jim

During the summer months of Ordinary time, the time which clergy wear green vestments and focus on the teachings of Jesus, we have heard, proclaimed in the Gospel of the Apostle John and through the Sacrament of the Word offered by Father Jason, about the feeding of the 5,000. There is so much teaching to do, seeing the multitude who were now following Him. He asked: "How are we to buy bread, so that these people may eat?" (John 6:5) You know how the disciples responded, It is IM-POSSIBLE. It would be better for you to send them away . . . " Jesus must have freaked them out, when He said: "Give them something to eat." He took a few loaves and a couple of fish, blessed them, broke them and distributed them to the multitude. In foretelling the Last Supper and the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist, we are also taught a very valuable lesson—the little bit that we have, if we place it-that is, surrender it in God's precious hands and share it in faith- it becomes a superabundant treasure.

The Food Ministry program is going great and reflects Christ to those in need of substance, fellowship, a few kind words and consistency of time and presence. The feeding of the needy is an imperative, ethical teaching of the Church as noted in the Word of God, but also in the teachings of the Church through the PNCC Future Direction's current Discipleship Program.


In my life I have made mistakes, some poor decisions and let some people down. I am thankful that God has, despite my short-comings, blessed me to be part of St. Mary's Food Ministry program. To be able to distribute food to the multitude, to be able to share the Word of God in conversation, in inspirational written words, to hang out with a great group of food preparers, and to feel the support of the parish is awesome.

The Food Ministry committee reviews the status of the program, receives updates on meals served and plans out the next three to six months. I am excited to share that we are continuing to offer our Food Ministry program each Wednesday at 4:00 pm (We usually start serving about 3:51) with meals being delivered to each partaker's vehicle or those that walk up for service. The Mission Team has been great with supplying hygiene kits for all and back to school backpacks for the kids that have been coming each week.

There are many, many lessons I have learned in the ten + years of doing food ministry and one, that was and still is difficult to ask for assistance and more importantly to accept the help. It would be most appreciated to have help in the following ways:

Prepare a meal: An array of meals from hot Polish dinners to Chef salads, hot and cold sandwiches have all been served. Food prep can take place on Tuesday or Wednesday. Let's find a day that works best for you and am glad to assist in obtaining the ingredients, etc.





"Food Pantry:" Not really a food pantry, but let's call it that for now. We plan on about 65 – 75 meals each week. Sometimes we run short because all the food has been distributed and someone shows up – rather than turning them away, donations of nonperishable items are an amazing means to help! Please consider donating.

As we are committed to this outreach and service, we commit our time and efforts to each other in support, in love, in understanding and in faith of doing what Christ has called us to do. Thank you in advance for your prayers, consideration, giving and time in support of St. Mary's Food Ministry.


Various Announcements



Reflection on Solemnity of Brotherly Love

THE GREATEST COMMANDMENT

The Greatest Commandments are taken from the story where Jesus is teaching and is asked by a

Pharisee, "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" Jesus' answer was, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." (Matt. 22:34-40)

SOLEMNITY OF BROTHERLY LOVE:

In 1897 Father Hodur and a group of people organized the first Polish National Catholic Church, Saint Stanislaus Parish, in Scranton, PA.

As the years went by Father Hodur was dismayed by the way others were mistreating members of our Church. He was sometimes saddened by the manner in which some Church members responded to this injustice. He was disappointed because the members of the Church were not following the Great Commandments. Father Hodur wanted the faithful to follow Christ and His teachings.

In 1904 the First General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church was held in Scranton, PA and in 1906 the First General Synod was reconvened to complete it. At these gatherings he proposed that we establish the Solemnity of Brotherly Love to be commemorated annually on the second Sunday in September as a reminder to all Polish National Catholics to be kind and loving to each other and to all people. Everyone at the Synod agreed and the Solemnity of Brotherly Love has been celebrated in the Polish National Catholic Church ever since. It is a day to remind us to love one another and to love all people.


