Remembering Bp. John

"You know, Jason- I share a birthdate with your grandmother Emily- May 15, 1933...but she is much prettier than I." If I heard it once or a hundred times, it didn't matter- it always made me smile. If the conversation ever approached New Hampshire (where my grandmother was from) or milestone birthdays, Bishop John Swantek would give me that reminder, always deferring to my father's mother's grace and charm.





Perhaps it is why I sought a degree in writing – it is much easier to convey emotions via a keyboard than a phone call or actual words...perhaps also a product of my generation. I recall doing the same some years ago upon the loss of Bishop Stanley Bilinski. It is cathartic for me, I suppose, and perhaps will allow others to know the man better because of my words.

In 1995, my home parish of St. Joseph's in Westfield, MA was holding its diamond jubilee, its 75th Anniversary, with it being a weekend long celebration featuring 3 Holy Masses celebrated by 3 bishops. The first, our former pastor and my dad's predecessor, the Rt. Rev. Robert Nemkovich, the Western Diocesan Bishop. The second

was the Rt. Rev. Thomas Gnat, our Diocesan Bishop in the Eastern Diocese...but the place was buzzing that the Prime Bishop was to be there for our anniversary. He also pastored St. Joseph's decades earlier, maintaining relationships even then.

It was genuinely excitingand perhaps as a precursor of life events to come, I served all 3

Masses that weekend, just to say I did. That is when I first learned of Bishop John's attachment to my family via shared birthdates with my grandmother...but I learned more that day too. Sometimes, we clergy don't quite grip the power a conversation with a 13 year old kid may have - that day, 20 or so minutes before Mass (an anomaly-living next to the church, I was notorious for arriving at Mass within 3 minutes of the bell ringing), Bishop told me how my great-grandfather ordained him at Holy Trinity Cathedral in Manchester, New Hampshire in 1958... coincidentally, the same month my father was born.

Besides a Youth Convocation every 2 years, I didn't see Bishop John again until a trip to Scranton and an 11am High Mass at the Cathedral – he made it such a big deal that I was there, asking about my family, recalling the college I was enrolled at, and knowing about my successes on the Track and Field team. He said "it isn't often we have a Division 1 athlete worship with us!" I think I blushed purple and mumbled "it isn't often the Prime Bishop remembers your name!" His response was that he was praying that perhaps he'd be seeing me again at seminary in a few years.

A prophet was he! And upon entering seminary, I learned to not refer to him as "Prime Bishop" anymore"There's only one now, and it isn't me!" From early on, Bishop John be-

came a mentor and an advocate. My entire clerical experience with him was after he held any parish or administrative position – he was retired and, well, comfortable. I've lamented how my relationship with Bishop Stanley changed once he was consecrated by the simple fact that he was now...my boss, and my bishop first and foremost.

Bishop John was my teacher at seminary and a retired clergyman, though he ministered extensively to the residents of the Manor at Waymart. This was a place where the patience of a father four times over and a grandfather many, many times over came into practice! He called us seminarians "fathers to be", which seemed so, so far off and laughable. He taught Sacramental Theology at a graduate level - with precision, with the proper difficulty and expectations attached. Class didn't begin until a hot mug of tea sat before him, and often the best parts were bouncing theological meanderings off of him. He'd take a deep breath, adjust that mug, and launch into answers from the points of view of the Fathers of the Church as well as how the Polish National Catholic Church might adjust off of them - invaluable teachings.

Bishop John was our advocate too- probably because he enjoyed not being in charge of the seminary anymore! We learned that he had no problem airing our concerns, questions, and frustrations. Sometimes this got us into some hot soup, but he didn't care about his own soup – just about ours. Or, maybe he just enjoyed being on the other side of that table after 16 years as Prime Bishop!

And finally, there was the sports. I lived in Scranton from 2004-2013. In that time, Bishop John and I laughed and congratulated each other on 3 World Series championships for the Red Sox, a Stanley Cup for the Bruins, an NBA Title for the

Celtics, and somehow only one Super Bowl for the Patriots. No worries on the last one, as we shared phone calls after I moved out to Ohio to consider Bill Belichick's and Tom Brady's chances at sainthood 3 more times. He would call Tom Brady such "an impressive young ball player", which sounds hilarious but, well, he was allowed to say that. As I was preparing to leave Scranton, Bishop started to transfer a portion of his library to me, for which I am exceedingly thankful. Theological timepieces from decades ago, along with others he kept sharp on. I've drawn upon dozens of them in the last half-decade in homilies, articles, and presentations. He would always ask me what I was reading...a prompt as good as any I have received to keep sharp on continuing education.

Until his health became an issue, he was always eager to lend his voice to any retreat I led or to fill a speaking timeslot in any chaplaincy I held. His retirement showed him itching to remain a teacher in Christ's Holy Church. In my last year or so in Scranton, I got great enjoyment at creating the "Celebrant's Schedule" at the Cathedral and Chapel- What "power" I had in being able to schedule him and two other bishops on a monthly basis- he was so thankful at that point in his ministry to be a part of that rotation. Though, if I ever mentioned that power, he'd give me "the look!": head lowered, peering over the top of his glasses with a furrowed brow.

Of course, there are many other thoughts and memories I can put on paper, but I close with this- though he was never my diocesan bishop, he was resolute to always build me up as a priest. Where most of us encounter life where one negative

outweighs the other 9 positives, he would remark on the positives in my ministry, however he could from his vantage point 300+ miles away. I was so, so honored when he called me early on in the pandemic to hand the phone to his granddaughter in order to figure out to watch St. Mary's broadcast Mass on a Sunday morning – that he went out of his way to allow me to minister to him on a Sunday morning.

May his memory be eternal – may the words at his funeral services be inspired by the Holy Spirit, and may our belief in the Resurrection of Jesus Christ be present and alive in how we remember his priest and bishop, the Most Rev. John F. Swantek.

Rorate Mass

The tradition of Rorate Mass extends to many, but not all Catholic parishes. Rorate Mass is a Votive Mass, celebrated in (Marian) white in honor of the blessed Mother for the season of Advent. Our Lady shows herself in a special way as our leader through Advent to Christmas. Mass was celebrated on Monday, December 20 by natural (candle) light only. All candles in the sanctuary were lighted, and the faithful having access to one. Tradition holds that It was to be celebrated "in media nocte", according to the Missal of 1570 no Mass could be said after 12 Noon, so it had to take place after the midnight change of day and should conclude as the sun rises. Our Mass began at 7am and concluded exactly at sunrise —



As we begin this Year of our Lord 2022 our Holy Church for this Year of Discipleship will focus on Being Eucharistic People. Reflecting on that most sacred moment each time when we encounter the Divine as we receive our Lord Jesus Christ in Holy Communion.

Scriptures for Reflection

1 Corinthians 11:23-26

Reflection:

Receiving our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist is a sacred and important moment for which we should be prepared. This is not something to take lightly as we are receiving Jesus to strengthen us on our earthly journey in the way that God has planned for our salvation. We must prepare to meet Jesus by fasting, prayer and participation in the Holy Sacrifice of Mass.

From the PNCC Prayer Book: Fasting is an ancient religious tradition, helping one focus on the needs of the soul over the needs of the body; the need for Christ over the needs of self. As Jesus said during His own forty-day fast, "Man does not live by bread alone, but by every word that



proceeds out of the mouth of God." Fasting before communion helps us properly prepare for the solemn and reverent receiving of His sacred Body and Blood. Fasting before Communion is not primarily an act of Penance, but one of homage to our Lord.

The faithful are required to fast for two hours before receiving Holy Communion. This means eating no food of any kind (except when necessary with medication) and drinking nothing except water. Exceptions to this fast are when someone has a medical condition that requires eating or drinking, when someone has diabetes, when a woman is pregnant, when the Eucharist is taken to someone who is sick, homebound or dying. This does not discourage the pious practice of fasting from midnight.

Action Items: Remember to fast and offer the Prayer before Holy Communion prior to beginning of Holy Mass and then remember to offer the prayer after Holy Communion from the prayer book.

Also consider a few minutes reading page 8 of the Mass Book prior to the beginning of Holy Mass.

When approaching the priest for Holy Communion make sure to do so reverently.

My dear God and loving Father, I thank You for making it possible for me to participate in the Holy Sacrifice of Mass, during which I will be united with my Lord Jesus Christ. May Jesus fill me with His holy grace when I open my heart to Him in sincere prayer. May the sacraments I will receive, the prayers that I will say and the hymns that I will sing bring me closer to Jesus and help me to be more like Him in all that I say and do. May the Holy Communion that I will receive give me strength, so that I may share faith, hope and love with the people I will meet. Amen.

Prayer After Holy Mass:

I am grateful to You, Lord, that I was able to come to church and participate in the Holy Sacrifice of Mass. I thank You for receiving Your gracious pardon, Your instruction and teaching through Your Word, and Your Body and Blood in Holy Communion. May Your sacraments continue to strengthen and help me to be faithful to You and Your Church. Help me to face all the challenges of life on my journey to Your heavenly kingdom. Amen.
